Dear parents and carers,



After 4 years as the principal of Seabrook Primary School, I'm proud to reflect on the way our school has gone from strength to strength!

Our school remains committed to continuous improvement in response to research evidence. Student learning and wellbeing are at the centre of every decision, ensuring we provide the very best education. New research informs teaching methods and curriculum programs, allowing us to set students up for success in an ever-changing world.

To ensure we draw upon the highest standards of evidence, we anchor our improvement in research published by the Australian Education Research Organisation (AERO), a national evidence body which exists as the result of a key recommendation from the Gonski Review 2.0, and is jointly funded by the Commonwealth, state and territory governments. AERO's standards of evidence prioritise rigour and relevance.

AERO's research on **how students learn best** (also known as **the science of learning**) connects <u>cognitive science</u>, <u>neuroscience and education psychology research.</u>

- 1. minimum expectations for systematic synthetic phonics programs (which we started implementing in 2022)

As a high-performing school with a well-earned reputation, Seabrook Primary School continues moving forward with evidence-based practices so long as we continue to see improving results. We have been focusing on teaching approaches that respond to our growing understanding about the science of learning that underpins the AERO/VTLM 2.0 model.

Our school leaders and teachers have been working extremely hard to improve on practices in response to research evidence.

Our staff have continued to engage in professional reading, webinars and PD to build knowledge. There is such commitment from our staff that we have about 30 who have put their name down for an optional professional learning day in the school holidays! This is mind-blowing, and reflects the level of commitment staff have to offering the very best to our students.

This year, many of our staff have conducted visits to other high-performing schools including Brandon Park PS, and Bentleigh West PS – a case study school in the recent Grattan Institute report: https://grattan.edu.au/report/the-maths-guarantee-a-guide-for-principals/

Further ideas have been sought from Templestowe Heights PS – a school that presented at the recent Victorian Government Schools Principal Conference.

Our principal class team attended The Age Schools Summit, where we listened to a range of cross-sector speakers and panels – ensuring our executive leadership team is united in building the knowledge that equips us to drive improvement from a strong position of deep understanding about current research.

REPORTING STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AND PROGRESS AT SEABROOK PS

The Semester 1 Student Report is due to go live on Compass this Friday 27th June. A Compass News Feed will notify parents when reports become available.

The Semester 1 report is an interim report. A graph representing your child's progress is included for the Victorian Curriculum learning areas of:

- Personal and Social Capability
- English (an achievement level in each area of English)
- Mathematics (a single overall achievement level)

The graph page will show the student's current teacher judgement about the level of achievement against the Victorian Curriculum achievement standards, and how this compares to the level typically expected at this stage of schooling.

Your child's teacher includes observations about effort, behaviour and learning characteristics (self-management and social skills).

Physical Education and other specialist areas are included in this report. These areas will be added to the graph page at the end of the year.

Opportunities are provided for parents/carers and students to discuss the school report with teachers. The mid-year student-led conference provides the chance for students to showcase their learning. Parents who wish to further discuss their child's progress after these conferences are able to request an appointment with the teacher.

The Semester 2 Student Report will be the provided in December and will include more comprehensive detail about your child's progress over the school year. This final report with contain a graph displaying the level of achievement for all curriculum areas taught during the course of the year.

To support our families with a clear understanding of the way we report student achievement and progress across each year at Seabrook, an infographic clearly shows the full picture and how the upcoming reports and student-led conferences fit into this. Please refer to the infographic in this newsletter.

SCHOOL STARTING TIME

At 8:40am, music plays over the speakers to signal that it's time to enter classrooms. Students should go inside to prepare for school to start.

At 8:50am, lessons promptly begin.

Late students (arriving after 8:50am) must get a late pass from a Compass kiosk and present this at class.

STUDENTS ARRIVING EARLY

Students must not be dropped at school without parent/carer supervision prior to 8:30am, regardless of age.

Staff supervision is not available prior to 8:30am.

- ☐ Drivers cannot stop on a bicycle path, footpath, shared path, dividing strip, or a nature strip adjacent to a length of road in a built-up area, unless there is permissive signage.



Thank you to the judges for assisting every week to get to the Grand Final, and thank you to our student helpers who set up and packed up each week.




The winner of SEABROOK'S GOT TALENT 2025:

The students in Grade One participated in a cooking experience to assist with writing procedure texts. Students wrote the materials/ingredients and steps needed to make funny face biscuits.


Students used marie biscuits, coloured icing, smarties, musk sticks and snakes to make their creations!

Foodbank Victoria Home Food Packs – Supporting Our School Community

Foodbank Victoria, in partnership with the Victorian Government launched the School Breakfast Clubs Program in 2016. The School Breakfast Clubs Program provides free breakfast foods to over 3000 Victorian schools; and its benefits have proven to be far reaching. Teachers have reported boosts to students' health and wellbeing, and strengthened academic and social outcomes. We are a not-for-profit, non-denominational, federated organisation operating in every state and territory in Australia. Foodbank Australia is the only Australian food relief organisation that is a certified member of The Global Foodbanking Network (GFN).

The inclusive program creates an environment to provide healthy food snacks for students at school, who might otherwise go hungry. With food in their stomachs, children and young people have an opportunity to better engage in the classroom, to focus on learning and achieve their highest potential. In addition to the Breakfast Club, fresh fruit and healthy snacks, Foodbank provides home food packs, which are offered at our school. This initiative is designed to assist families who may be experiencing food insecurity or have limited access to fresh, nutritious food at home.

FOODBANK

The Home Food Packs contain a range of pantry staples, such as soups, canned goods, cereals, spreads, fruit cups, tuna rice meals, and long-life milk. These food packs are available free of charge and can be provided to families in need throughout the school term.

iPad and MacBook 1to1 Programs - Bring Your Own Device

In preparation for next year, some families have already begun asking questions and taking steps to secure a suitable device for their child(ren). To support this, we've updated the information available on our school website for families wanting to learn more about our two 1to1 Programs and how to choose the right device for use at Seabrook Primary School.

The school will continue to offer two dedicated 1to1 Programs: the iPad 1to1 Program for students in Prep to Year 2, and the MacBook 1to1 Program for students in Years 2 to 6. Please note that students in Years 2 and 3 will remain part of a transitional model throughout 2025–2027, with the understanding that by the time students enter Year 4, they should have their own new or used MacBook for school use. We aim to provide families with several years of notice to help them make informed decisions and allow time to plan for the purchase of the correct device.


Shared classroom iPads and MacBooks will continue to be available in limited numbers for families who decide their child is not yet ready to bring their own device.


