We feel very proud and privileged that the Department chose Seabrook Primary School to be one of three Victorian schools to host the filming of Phonics Plus lessons.

Our film stars included staff and students: Mrs. Thomson, Miss Spiteri and students from 0PT, 0RS, 2CS and 2ML.

Phonics Plus is a high-quality program across P-2 that covers:

- Grapheme-phoneme correspondences for reading and spelling
- Spelling patterns
- Phonemic awareness
- Letter knowledge (Prep)
- High-frequency words
- Multisyllabic words (Year 1 and 2)
- Morphemes
- Phonological awareness (Prep)
- Decodable texts (Prep and Year 1)
- Fluency
- Handwriting

Various components of the Phonics Plus program were professionally filmed.

Our expert teachers showcased high quality instruction and demonstrated the outstanding teaching practices in place at our school. These videos will form part of a professional learning package provided to schools across the state to support the implementation of Phonics Plus.

Phonics Plus filming day

SUCCESSFUL CURRICULUM DAY (Friday 24th of October)

During our recent Curriculum Day on the 24th of October, we welcomed Claire Scott, who trained all staff in the implementation of *Spelling Mastery*. Teachers engaged in learning about the program's structure and the research evidence supporting its effectiveness. All staff had the opportunity to practise teaching techniques by rehearsing together.

Year 3-6 classes will move to full implementation of Spelling Mastery in 2026. Look for this textbook on the revised booklists. Year 3 will have two books listed (both Book C and Book D). This enables Year 3 to start Book C at the beginning of the year, and then Book D in Term 4 – which will then continue into the first half of Year 4.

As part of this day, our Literacy Team also trained staff in using *The Writing Revolution* approach, underpinning much of our new writing sequence.

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR 2026

We know that a duck can appear to be smoothly gliding along the surface, while the hard work propelling it forward is not so obvious. This is a suitable analogy for our Seabrook leaders, who have been working incredibly hard to revise and strengthen our curriculum programs ahead of 2026.

A summary of several developments:


- The **timetable** will provide seven sessions per day instead of five. School start and finish times will not change. Instead of five 60-minute sessions per day, the timetable will include six 45-minute lessons following an initial 30-minute lesson in classrooms. All children will start the school day in their classrooms. Following successful trials, all children will go outside for the morning play at the same time. The afternoon playtime will continue the split approach between P-2 and 3-6 students.
- **Science** will be a new addition to our specialist subjects. Students at every year level will continue to go to STEM every week, and they will also go to a dedicated weekly Science lesson with a science specialist teacher.
- Homework will involve a consistent schoolwide approach. A dedicated New Wave Mental Maths and New Wave English Skills Practice textbooks are being added to the booklists for homework from Years 1-6. This approach will provide a daily consistent routine, designed to provide practice for students. OSHClub staff will be better able to offer support, because every child will have the same homework routine using a consistent format with daily homework for Monday-Thursday nights. Further details will follow.
- Strengthened approaches towards **reading and mathematics intervention**, building upon the new programs implemented this year, where small group learning follows explicit instruction in break-out rooms, robust universal screening informs student eligibility, and progress monitoring ensures the duration matches the need.
- An even stronger **Mathematics program** has been developed, increasing the number of maths lessons, and using evidence-based programs such as the **Explicit Mathematics Program** in Years P-3, and a refined program sequence in Years 4-6, which will include the **Maths Mastery Series**. These will be on the 2026 booklists.
- A new Singapore Bar Model Method program that runs from P-6, where students will engage
 in a weekly problem-solving lesson and use bar modelling to support a more efficient approach
 towards solving worded maths problems.
- Classrooms environments that support student focus and attention will mean that all classrooms will be kept quite plain at the front, reducing distractions, with carefully curated usage of display space at the rear.
- **Phonics Plus** will be embedded across the P-2 program. Refer to the first item in this newsletter for further information.
- **Spelling Mastery** will strengthen spelling skills across Years 3-6.
- A detailed, explicit Writing Scope and Sequence will ensure that students writing skills are developed sequentially across P-6, focusing on explicit sentence level instruction, teaching students how to construct clear, grammatically correct, and well-structured sentences. Students are then able to plan paragraph outlines and develop compositions that increase in complexity.



- An **Explicit Wellbeing Curriculum** has been developed to ensure that all students engage in a weekly lesson focusing on values, behaviours, Health Education, and personal and social development.
- A schoolwide **Behaviour Curriculum**, focusing on whole-school routines such as the
 expectations for lining up, entering and exiting the classroom, moving from room to room, and
 common classroom routines such as the use of mini whiteboards and how to respond to cues
 for attention.
- Knowledge-rich units will form a key part of the English program, with a focus on knowledge-building to support reading comprehension and writing. Teaching the Humanities through the English program provides a rich context for literacy learning. Humanities include Australian and World History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business.
- **Novel units** and **text studies** are being developed for all year levels. Some of these will be included on the 2026 booklists as follows:

NATALIE WEXLER'S VISIT TO AUSTRALIA

Natalie Wexler is an American education writer focusing on literacy and equity issues. I attended her presentation in North Melbourne at The Academy (Bastow) earlier this week.

Seabrook literacy leaders went to Dandenong on Monday afternoon for her presentation on "Writing in a knowledge-rich curriculum", and around 20 of our Seabrook staff are heading to Ballarat tomorrow, where she will be one of the guest speakers at the Sharing Best Practice Conference. Some of her books have made it onto our professional reading-wall outside my office in the admin building. If you're passing the school fishpond, pop inside the side door and scan the book wall. This will help to see the kind of professional literature we are drawing upon alongside the research from AERO (Australian Education Research Organisation).

CANTEEN NEWS

The current canteen operator will continue until the end of this term and won't be returning in 2026.

We will use this as an opportunity to take our canteen facility in a different direction for now – and make use of the space more as a school.

Starting in 2026, we will use <u>Classroom Cuisine</u> for lunch orders. Parents order online directly with Classroom Cuisine by 8:30am. This will be available every day except Tuesdays.

The **menu** offers a 2-course or 3-course lunch. The delivery includes the sorting into our tubs ready for lunch monitors to collect.

Lunches are either cold or room temperature. However, the food is *very* fresh... with sushi made that morning. Breads are baked by Bakers Delight or Brumby's on the same morning too.

<u>Classroom Cuisine will become available for lunch orders on Thursday 29th January 2026</u> (second day of school for students).

What about counter sales?

We know kids love the experience of going to the canteen, and we'll make sure they can still do this. We will look at options for school-run counter sales, e.g., looking at how we might use staff, volunteers and/or students to assist. We may not have this running at the very start of the year.

A bonus for Breakfast Club

We are exploring the way we can move the Breakfast Club to our own canteen facility, making it more accessible to the whole school, with grab-and-go options, and maybe even sit-down options using the gym, which won't be needed for lessons until 9:20am, allowing plenty of time to clean up. Watch this space.

For the remainder of this term, our students will continue to enjoy the services that our current canteen provider offers, with friendly counter sales and delicious lunch orders.

2026 PARENT PAYMENTS

Parents can expect to see significantly lower curriculum contributions (previously \$325 per year), while booklists will see an increase as we continue to strengthen our learning programs using carefully curated, high-quality resources.

- The use of technology is decreasing.
- The use of books is increasing.
- Curriculum contribution amounts (previously "school fees") are going down.
- Booklist amounts are going up. This is due to our increasing use of quality books to support learning. (An estimate is approximately \$200 per student, but COS is costing up the totals at present.)

Please carefully read the attached Parent Payments 2026 information.

The school strongly recommends you purchase selected stationery/book items from COS Office Supplies for your child to individually own and use.

Parents choosing to purchase any item elsewhere should ensure it is identical (brand, model, colour, etc). Some items are COS-branded. Please do not send alternatives to school for use. The book pack items have been carefully curated for seamless classroom use and longevity.

Curriculum Contributions are significantly decreasing from \$325pp (previous years) to \$95pp (2026).

Book packs (booklists) are significantly increasing due to the inclusion of new literature and textbooks, and higher quality stationery such as higher quality whiteboard markers that last longer, do not smudge, and can be left uncapped for a time without needing to be discarded.

Device expectations are significantly decreasing. We are making changes to technology usage from 2026. Parents do not need to purchase devices for 2026.

Booklists will be released very soon, with a small window for free delivery.

Time: 5:00 PM - 7:00 PM


This venue provides an enhanced experience for our graduates and their families, allowing for a more formal and memorable celebration.



Grade 1 Earth Crusaders Eco Incursion












On Wednesday the 22nd and Thursday the 23rd of October, the Grade One students took part in an exciting eco-incursion, learning how to become true Earth Crusaders! The focus of the incursion was on the 4Rs: Reduce, Reuse, Regyele, and Rethink, and students explored the importance of sustainability and caring for our planet.

Students learned about the III expels of trash and where it goes after we dispose of it. A key lesson involved learning to sort waste into the correct coloured bins, ensuring that rubbish, recycling, and compost are disposed of properly. One surprising fact that students discovered is that some materials. like foil balloons, can take over 1000 years to decompose!

We also watched a demonstration of what happens when litter makes its way into rivers and creeks. We watched clean water become dirty and unhealthy, as it was filled with rubbish. Students were encouraged to think about how this affects animals living in the environment.

To wrap up the experience, students had some fun decorating their own reusable tote bags to take home. We're so proud of their enthusiasm and can't wait to see them apply these eco-friendly habits at school and at home!

Grade 3's completed an Inquiry unit on the Vikings. We learnt about ruins, the life of children, raiding and trading, longships and Gods and Goddesses. On the 21st of October, all 6 Grade 3 classes went to Melbourne Museum to consolidate our learning. We explored the Galloway Hoard Viking Exhibition where we got to see artefacts and treasures from the early medieval kingdoms of Britain and Ireland, mainland Europe, and Central Asia.

The Hoard was a special vessel that held silver and gold materials. We looked at the artefacts, used 3D screens to see each artefact more clearly and watched videos about how the artefacts were found. Whilst at the museum, we also looked at the other exhibitions such as Dynamic Earth, Triceratops, Melbourne Story, 600 Million Years and the Milari Gardens.



Regional Basketball Finals





Well done to our girls basketball team (Ariana, Ava H, Ava W, Imogen, Mahveen, Matilda, Myra, Mila, Paige and Tahlia) who competed last week at the regional finals at Altona stadium. We were one of 8 teams, who qualified from the whole western metropolitan region. This stretches from Williamstown around to Sunshine, Footscray, Point Cook, Werribee, Bacchus Marsh, Geelong, the Bellarine peninsula and all suburbs in between. All teams had won their respective divisions in the weeks leading up to the day. We played against The Grange in game 1. Our girls played quite well after a slow start, however The Grange were very strong and scoring more regularly than us. We held our own in the 2nd half and got to 23 points v 52 for The Grange.

Game 2 was against Our Lady Star of the Sea from the Bellarine Peninsula. They were also a very strong team and we held our own early only being 4 or 5 points down at half time. Unfortunately Our Lady Star of the Sea kept inching further in front and whilst we had many looks in offence, not many of our shots were dropping in like they had in the first half. In the end the scores were 19 - 43. Our Lady Star of the Sea would go on to win the whole day, defeating Bacchus Marsh by 20 points, which shows that we had the tougher side of the draw, especially when Bacchus Marsh had convincingly beaten their 3 rivals in their games.

In the final match, we came up against St Patricks from the Geelong area. 

- Grade 3 5 students: We try to ensure the total sum for does not extend much past \$400.
- Grade 6 students: Available experiences can reach around \$600 across a year due to interschool sports, a suitable camp, and graduation.

Educational items for students to own

The school *strongly recommends* you purchase selected stationery/book items from **COS Office Supplies** for your child to individually own and use.

Parents choosing to purchase any item elsewhere should ensure it is identical (brand, model, colour, etc). Some items are COS-branded. Please do not send alternatives to school for use. The book pack items have been carefully curated for seamless classroom use and longevity.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Our approach towards curriculum contributions and booklists is changing in 2026.

Curriculum Contributions are significantly *decreasing* from \$325pp (previous years) \rightarrow \$95pp (2026).

Book packs (booklists) are significantly *increasing* due to the inclusion of new literature and textbooks, and higher quality stationery to optimise instruction time - such as higher quality whiteboard markers that last longer, do not smudge, and can be left uncapped for a time without needing to be discarded.

Device expectations are significantly *decreasing*. We are making changes to technology usage from 2026.

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:



Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

• Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES
